## **President's Report**

It looks like Punxsutawney Phil was right on the mark in Florida. The weather has been gorgeous. And with the time change, it's been so nice walking the dogs after dinner and visiting with all of Raven and Buddha's friends. We even had a birthday party for Raven the first night of Daylight Savings Time, when 16 of her neighborhood and rescue friends came to have cake and ice cream. It was such a fun event.

Now is also the time to get outdoors with your dog to work with them. After all, they are working dogs. But this doesn't mean getting a cart and learning how to draft or finding a pool or body of water that doesn't have gators to learn to retrieve floats, boats, or people, unless you want to. We can do so many other things with our dogs that don't require expensive equipment.

The Canine Good Citizen test is a great place to start. The ten skills teach the dog to be a polite member of society. Disciplines such as sitting politely to be petted, walking through a crowd by your side, being groomed without wandering all over the place, or my favorite (the one that took Raven twice to pass), coming when called.

The best part is you can teach the dog yourself without a trainer. There are plenty of YouTube videos on the ten items in the test, with many great pointers. You can also go to the AKC site for a list with helpful hints.

Once you have this base, the dog can go in many directions. The one I was always interested in was Rally. This is a "team sport" where you and your dog navigate through a course of 10-20 different signs, which provides a distinct skill for you and your dog to complete. Although the event is timed, having the fastest time is not the goal. It's working together as a team to complete the task. I first saw this a couple of years ago at Nationals and thought it would be so much fun to do with Raven, but there is that coming when she wants to, not when you want her to, that we are still dealing with. Man, is she one stubborn girl.

These are just two disciplines you can do with your dog. You can have fun training with no intention of testing or training to put a couple of letters behind their name. It's all about bonding with your dog, at something they were bred to do. Which brings me to PAL numbers. Your dog must be registered with the AKC to test at an AKC event. Many of our rescues didn't come with papers, so they feel they are excluded from doing any of these fun events. That's not the case. Getting a PAL (Purebred Alternative Listing) number through the AKC is easy. Just complete the application with all the information you have about your dog, take the necessary pictures AKC requires, and submit. Once accepted, your dog will receive an official certificate that records your dog's name. From there, you can participate in many AKC events.

Just a quick note about Dog Training Clubs. These clubs are a great place to start if you want more than YouTube videos to guide you through some of the disciplines. Go to the AKC website to find a club near you.

I hope this encourages you to get out and enjoy the weather and time with your dog. 
to open a business. It was great to see

#### Report

As you can see above, we have reorganized the Board of Directors and added Laura Feldman as a Director. We also have a new mailing address and phone number to use when applying for sponsorship/grants and on our new website and soon-to-be Instagram page. It's these little changes that take NRF to a new level.

Of the seven (7) dogs we neutered or spayed in 2023, the average cost was \$472.53. That is a 60% increase over last year. In the first 75 days of this year, we have already spent \$3,811.99 on five (5) spays and neuters. That averages out to \$762.40. That is a 60% increase already over last year. The same is happening with wellness checks, which include vaccinations.

At last count, we have seven (7) current dogs yet to be spayed/neutered in the coming year. Donna Viger is spearheading the project of finding low-cost spay/neuter and vaccination clinics in each county throughout Florida. Once we have this information, we will steer our fosters and adopters towards these options. If you have any knowledge of low-cost clinics in your area, please contact Donna at dmv1984@yahoo.com.

With the increase in cost across the board, we have begun applying for grants. Club member and adopter of Ellie has volunteered her time to seek out and write the grants. Grant writing is an art, and it takes time to research the organization and write specifically about our organization to meet the criteria of the specific grant. We await a reply from our first go at a grant from a Florida organization. If you know any organization or corporation you think we should apply to, send that information to info@newfoundlandrescuefl. org.

#### **Currently in Rescue**

We have five (5) dogs in 2024 and two (2) from 2023 in rescue.

Blue has been moved to a new foster to get better treatment options. This change seems to be working ever so slightly. We are now seeing some hair growth on his back, and he is beginning to put on weight. Blue will be ready to adopt after his "low-cost" neuter at the end of April.

Dixie has been with us since the end of December, and we recently moved to a second foster. What we thought were behavioral issues may be health-related issues. Dixie will see a cardiologist soon for a definitive diagnosis so we and future adopters can move forward.





When Lena came in at the beginning of February, she had a severely infected ear and some skin issues. It turned out that some of the infection was coming from the 12 stitches the previous owner had left in her ear from draining a hematoma. All but two stitches have been removed (the current vet could not extract them and said they would work out on their own), and Lena is ready for adoption. She will need to get spayed at NRF expense.

Macy is brand new to rescue and is looking for a foster to do further evaluation. What we know now is that she is up-to-date on shots, spayed, and on preventatives. She does have ear infections from time to time that Zymox takes care of. Macy has a "sister," a 10-year-old Schnauzer who is also being rehomed due to this family life change. Ellie gave Virgil a wide berth. Virgil was jealous whenever Ellie came near his human Dad, or his food. There were skirmishes, every day at first. But we kept a close eye on the dogs, fed them separately and the fights became few and far between. After a few weeks we



took Ellie to be spayed. We were worried that Virgil might try to attack her when she came home from surgery. But he took one look at the cone on her head and stayed away. After the cone came off I heard some snorting sounds behind me. I turned around to see Ellie and Virgil playing! They've been pals ever since. We had not seen Virgil play like that since he lost his big sister. Two months after Ellie came to our home as a foster, we officially adopted her. We are thrilled to have a Newf again. And we are especially happy that we were able to rescue a Newf in need.
