President's Report

Well, the time has come for me to say "À bientôt," – See you soon. The last five years have flown by so fast. We have made many strides on both the club and rescue side of the house, of which we can all be proud.

Club

- We have automated our membership process so that new members and membership renewals can be completed online. This has saved us time and money. We no longer need to pay the high postage or printing fees for membership renewals, and our membership chair can download a simple report to confirm who has applied/reapplied.
- All of the paper files, that have been traveling from one president to the next, are now digitized, and a shared drive was created to maintain ongoing files.
- The working dog program has gained momentum with our new chairs, Jennifer Arent and Taylor Vinge. Their enthusiasm has attracted more people to learn about draft in anticipation of testing next year. Also, more people have expressed an interest in learning more about water work, scent, obedience, and rally. Training videos are being made, and seminars are being scheduled.
- Our community participation has increased under Bruce Meligan's direction. We have added events such as the Brooksville Pumpkin Patch in the fall and Martini and Mutts when we can get a time slot. More members from around the state are beginning to organize local meet-and-greets like the recent one in Orlando.

It took many members to bring these positive changes to life. Jennifer Arent is committed to listening to what members seek from our club and will work hard to continue the progress.

Rescue saw the most significant change in the past five years.

 After many years of contemplation and discussion, the rescue became a 501(c)3 charitable organization, now

- known as the Newfoundland Rescue of Florida, LLC. This change has already seen an increase in donations and events in which we can now participate.
- The rescue now has new software to process foster and adoption applications. This software is self-contained so that everyone on the rescue team can access an applicant's or dog's most current records. The rescue team is a welloiled machine when processing applications and matching the dog to the right applicant.
- All previous adoption folders have been digitized and available to our rescue team through a shared drive
- The parade packet and registration are now online, saving us money on postage and printing while allowing us to more accurately track who is coming and how the finances are broken down for more accurate accounting for tax purposes.

Sandy Miller has already begun talking to members about how they can help the rescue achieve some of its lofty fundraising goals. If you wish to help the rescue in some capacity, reach out to Sandy.

I started this section by saying, "See you soon," because although I'm moving overseas, I will still be involved in both organizations as Past President. I will be handling some behind-the-scenes work related to forms and the newsletter in the near future, so don't be surprised if you get an email from me from the parade or editor's email address.

Clint and I want to thank you for embracing us over the years. Raven and Buddha also give a big tail wag to all the friends they have met over the years. This is a new adventure for our family, full of all the possibilities we can imagine. Please give the next Presidents all the love and support you have given me.





Training Your Newfoundland

Hello everyone! I hope you are out and about with your Newfie socializing and enjoying the beautiful Florida weather. Of course, this entails answering the same wonderful Newfie Questions: How much does he/she weigh, how much does he/ she eat, you must live in a big house, who is walking who? Etc. LOL! The only drawbacks to walking your Newfie are all the questions and the picture taking.

Now, let's talk a little about training your Newfie, whether you are just bringing him/her home or if you have an older Newf that is causing problems. I personally think the biggest mistake new Newfie owners make is thinking their normal routine will remain the same other than adding a dog into the mix. When you add a Newfie into your home, your "routine" will and should change to accommodate the dog's needs. Newfoundland dogs grow so quickly over the first year that people have a tendency to forget that they are still a puppy in a huge body. Their size makes them look like an adult, but we have to remember they are not going to behave like an adult. If you are bringing an older Newf into your home, you must remember, they may have never learned the proper way to behave in a home, and it is now up to you to teach them in a loving and positive way.

Many people think it is mean to put their Newf in a crate, but it is the opposite. Crate training can save your Newf from ingesting something that may result in a vet visit, surgery, and a big vet bill. Also, in Florida, with the hurricanes, you never know when you may have to have them crated.

Don't use a crate as a disciplinary tool. Make the crate a safe place. I feed my dogs in their crates and they stay in their crates any time that I leave the house to avoid damage to themselves or to the house. I've heard people say that they are too big for crates, but that is simply not the case. Even Amazon sales 48" crates, and you can also find Great Dane crates that give extra height. The next question is, how do I teach my Newf to go in a crate? Help is only a few key strokes away. There are many trainers that have wonderful training videos on Youtube. Two of my favorites are Nate Schoemer and Susan Garrett. I highly recommend them as your source to at-home training. The more you train your Newf, the happier your home will be. You can simply go to Youtube and then click the search bar. Enter either of these two trainers and put what you need help with, and I promise they will give you great advice in an easy-to-follow video.

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
If you have children, please get them involved in the training process. If they are very young, just watching you train your Newf will teach them the value of it, and as they get older, you should include them in the training process. My daughter, Taylor Vinge, was in 3rd grade when we got our first Newf. I got her involved in the teaching process right away. The first lesson was the proper way to approach a Newf and play with a Newf without hurting our dog or herself. Children sometimes think because of their giant size, it is fine to sit on them like a horse, but this is far from the truth. Their back muscles are not strong enough and this could cause damage to the dog, not to mention the child falling and getting hurt. Newfoundland dogs grow and mature up to four years of age.

I have increased my knowledge of training over the last 3-4 years, with the Youtube videos and getting involved in a local dog training facility. I take all kinds of classes and learn different ways to train. I take what I see works for my individual dog and run with it. All three of my Newfs learn and pick up training skills in different manners and at different speeds. I have come to believe baby steps are the way to go. For example, when teaching a dog to "Stay", start by saying the command and pivoting in front, wait 3 seconds and pivot back to heel position. Say "yes" and treat. If you don't have a solid "stay", you should not go any further away than the pivot. As the "stay" becomes solid, take one step away and then pivot. Repeat by only one step until the skill is solid. If you try to go to far away too soon, the dog will not understand and will not stay and you will become frustrated. Baby Steps are so important!
